Q: What are you most looking forward to getting your teeth into at Planning Insight?

The prospect of getting involved in some the exciting projects which Planning Insight has in the pipeline at the moment is extremely tempting. It's a unique site and one which has heaps of potential, whilst at the same time having many hurdles to overcome.
